At the same time, soil provides living space for humans, as well as essential ecosystem services which are important for water regulation and supply, climate regulation, biodiversity conservation, carbon sequestration and cultural services. But soils are under pressure from increases in population, higher demands for food and competing land uses. Approximately 33% of our global soils are degraded and policy makers around the world are exploring opportunities to embrace sustainable development via the sustainable development goals.

"As inhabitants of this precious Earth, I believe each of us must play a role in protecting its finite resources. But before you decide your next course of action - be it attending a climate march or writing a check to your favourite ecofriendly charity - I suggest that you first be still, close your eyes, and listen to the whisperings of your soul.



Because though we all know what we need to do to address the concrete outer dimensions of the climate challenge - through science, politics and energy - I believe that work must be grounded in what I call the "inner dimensions" to climate action. Before we can act effectively, we must find in our hearts the will to protect the vulnerable, the sense of responsibility to preserve the splendour of nature, and the bravery to change the world.

The Bible says to care for the most vulnerable, that we must protect "the least among us," but this sentiment is hardly unique to Christianity. In the face of such overwhelmingly bad news, spiritual growth prepares us to withstand the constant stress of planetary crisis, to face the torrent of extreme weather disasters with a willingness to help instead of a retreat to denial and ignorance in the face of such widespread suffering.

Following this year's climate negotiations, we hope that more and more of the faith-based climate activists will connect with one another and with their civil society partners to make the faith movement a powerful force in addressing the climate threat and protecting vulnerable communities.

While the external demands of climate action can feel overwhelming, cultivating the inner strength to face them is a matter of faith.

In Luke 18:1-8, Jesus speaks of a widow whose demands for justice are met only after her unrelenting persistence, teaching us the importance of advocacy as prayer.

I have been guided by the belief that when I take action for justice, based on the values that have been formed in me by my faith, I am, in fact, praying.

I believe you, too, can find this guidance, whether you follow a deeply rooted faith practice or simply meditate on the stirrings of your heart. Within your heart are values, treasures really - compassion, courage, forgiveness, ambition. These values and more will reveal themselves if you open yourself to them. Our actions depend on these values. Climate action begins within. For me, climate action is prayer."

Our difficulty in taking up this challenge [Justice between the generations] seriously has much to do with an ethical and cultural decline which has accompanied the deterioration of the environment. Men and women of our postmodern world run the risk of rampant individualism, and many problems of society are connected with today's self-centred culture of instant gratification. We see this in the crisis of family and social ties and the difficulties of recognizing the other. Parents can be prone to impulsive and wasteful consumption, which then affects their children who find it increasingly difficult to acquire a home of their own and build a family. Furthermore, our inability to think seriously about future generations is linked to our inability to broaden the scope of our present interests and to give consideration to those who remain excluded from development. 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Canticle of Creation



Schnabelewopski Music does not exist without air! And this is not only true for wind instruments like trumpets or flutes - No, not even sounds nor words would be audible; not even the big bang. I am sure you'll want to know now what any of this has to do with Mr. Schnabelewopski. The "Memoires of Mr. Schnabelewopski" is a story by Heinrich Heine from the year 1831. It was read by the famous musician Richard Wagner, who was deeply impressed. The story is about a Dutch captain who insulted God. As punishment, he is unable to find a harbour and has to again and again cross the stormy sea. Only a faithful lover could lift his curse. 22 **Friday** Richard Wagner was in debt. His creditors were demanding their money back, but he was not earning enough to pay them. He found himself in such a precarious situation that he fled to England with his wife Minna. It was the year 1839 and airplanes did not exist yet. So, they travelled by ship, which was not always easy depending on weather conditions. And the inevitable happened: The ship was hit by a powerful storm and poor Mr and Mrs Wagner got terribly sea sick. Green-faced, Richard Wagner remembered the story of Schnabelewopski by Heinrich Heine. Despite his seasickness and due to his being an excellent musician, he imagined the thunder as kettledrums and wind as violins. His art helped him to overcome the terrible situation. And this is how his opera "The Flying Dutchman" was born with tremendous lightning, wind and thunderstorms. Without weather and climate it would unfortunately be: NOTHING!
