
LENTEN WATER MEDITATIONS

1 Kings 18:1-6

This was six months after the king was told there would be neither dew nor rain, and from this period the three years in this passage are computed.

The king had remained obdurate and impenitent. Another opportunity was to be given him of repentance, and Elijah was sent in order to declare to him the cause of the national judgment, and to promise him, on condition of his removing it, the immediate blessing of rain. The question for us – from what do we need to repent?
