World Environment Day

2019 Theme - "Beat Air pollution!"

"We can't stop breathing. But we can do something about the quality of our air"

Air pollution is defined as "degradation of air quality with negative effects on human health or the natural or built environment due to the introduction, by natural processes or human activity, into the atmosphere of substances (gases, aerosols) which have a direct (primary pollutants) or indirect (secondary pollutants) harmful effect." The quality of the air we breathe depends on the lifestyle choices we make every day.




Erupting volcanoes, earthquakes, dust storms and meteorites smashing into the Earth's crust are natural phenomena that can cause climate change and air pollution: dinosaurs may have met their end after a giant meteorite kicked up so much dust that it blocked out the sun for decades, reducing photosynthesis and preventing the growth of plants.


Adding to these potential threats, human-kind are now contributing to air pollution and global warming through our resource-intensive lifestyles. We're producing and consuming more than ever before, and we're generating more greenhouse gases as a result, as well

as air pollutants in the form of chemicals and particulate matter.

Although they may seem to be two very different issues, climate change and air pollution are closely interlinked, so by reducing air pollution we also protect the climate. Air pollutants include more than just greenhouse gases—principally carbon dioxide but also methane, nitrous oxide and others - but there's a big overlap: the two often interact with each other.

Switching to renewable sources of energy is an important part of the solution to both climate change and air pollution. Our immediate task is to cut down on the release of long-lived



Representing the Holy Spirit that descended "like a dove" and hovered over Jesus when he was baptized. Symbol of peace.



13 ¹⁻³ At about that same time Jesus left the house and sat on the beach. In no time at all a crowd gathered along the shoreline, forcing him to get into a boat. Using the boat as a pulpit, he addressed his congregation, telling stories.

³⁻⁸ "What do you make of this? A farmer planted seed. As he scattered the seed, some of it fell on the road, and birds ate it. Some fell in the gravel; it sprouted quickly but didn't put down roots, so when the sun came up it withered just as quickly. Some fell in the weeds; as it came up, it was strangled by the weeds. Some fell on good earth, and produced a harvest beyond his wildest dreams.

¹⁰ The disciples came up and asked, "Why do you tell stories?"

¹¹⁻¹⁵ He replied, "You've been given insight into God's kingdom. You know how it works. Not everybody has this gift, this insight; it hasn't been given to them. Whenever someone

has a ready heart for this, the insights and understandings flow freely. But if there is no readiness, any trace of receptivity soon disappears. That's why I tell stories: to create readiness, to nudge the people toward receptive insight. In their present state they can stare till doomsday and not see it, listen till they're blue in the face and not get it. I don't want Isaiah's forecast repeated all over again:

Your ears are open but you don't hear a thing. Your eyes are awake but you don't see a thing. The people are blockheads!

They stick their fingers in their ears

so they won't have to listen;

They screw their eyes shut

so they won't have to look,

so they won't have to deal with me face-to-face

and let me heal them.



¹⁶⁻¹⁷ "But you have God-blessed eyes—eyes that see! And God-blessed ears—ears that he ar! A lot of people, prophets and humble believers among them, would have given anything to see what you are seeing, to hear what you are hearing, but never had the chance.

¹⁸⁻¹⁹ "Study this story of the farmer planting seed. When anyone hears news of the kingdom and doesn't take it in, it just remains on the surface, and so the Evil One comes along and plucks it right out of that person's heart. This is the seed the farmer scatters on the road.

²⁰⁻²¹ "The seed cast in the gravel—this is the person who hears and instantly responds with enthusiasm. But there is no soil of character, and so when the emotions wear off and some difficulty arrives, there is nothing to show for it.

²² "The seed cast in the weeds is the person who hears the kingdom news, but weeds of worry and illusions about getting more and wanting everything under the sun strangle what was heard, and nothing comes of it.

²³ "The seed cast on good earth is the person who hears and takes in the News, and then produces a harvest beyond his wildest dreams."



13 The Great Chain of Being

All of Nature Has Soul Friday, February 6, 2015

Love is a deep empathy with the other's "Beingness." You recognize yourself, your essence, in the other. And so you can no longer inflict suffering on the other. - Eckhart Tolle

Eco-spirituality allows you to start seeing your own soul imaged and given back to you in the soul of everything else, because people who have allowed their own soul to be awakened will recognize that soul in



other places too! Soulless people will not see that. Once you are reconnected, it's no longer a disenchanted universe, but in fact, quite the opposite.

If we realized we were connected, we could never have poured chemicals and pollutants into the rivers of the world. We could never have filled the earth with trash and garbage and eternal plastic and Styrofoam if we had experienced the soul of the world or if we had suffered, as the Latin poet Virgil wrote, "the tears of things." But the material world was of no consequence to most of us. The world was just here as a backdrop while we humans tried to "get to heaven." Please notice that the Bible ends with a promise of "a new heavens and a new earth" (Revelation 21:1). The whole Earth and all of creation is participating in God's loving redemption, liberation, and salvation. Stingy people manufactured quite a stingy God, whose love was anything but infinite, eternal, or perfect. As a result most people just lost interest. (If you doubt me, look at the dismal European and American statistics around religion.)

Our lovely theory of redemption increasingly applied to only humans, and then fewer and fewer of them. Once the scarcity model takes over, it just keeps moving! Later Christian history did not envision God saving humanity/history as a whole, but just individuals. The genius of the Hebrew Scriptures, which formed Jesus, was that God was saving Israel, history, humanity! It was very different from our much later notion of God saving isolated people here and there—because they were "nice," and even that niceness was largely determined by the cultural and ethnic standards of each era. This was not necessarily a love of Jesus or a participation in God's "salvation history"; it was getting Jesus to participate in our little project. We could not believe in God's infinite victory, so we created a small victory where we could determine the outcome. We ended up with a simplistic reward/punishment contest at which very few would consider themselves even candidates for the contest.

Try reversing this oft used statement: "Jesus came to fulfill us" to "We have come to fulfill Christ." We are each invited to offer our unique and little selves "to create a unity in the work of service and thus build up the Body" (Ephesians 4:12). We are part of a movement of the ever-growing Cosmic Christ that is coming to be in "one great big act of giving birth" (Romans 8: 22-23). In Christ, "everything is reconciled, in heaven and on Earth" (Colossians 1:17). The eternal Christ saves us all by including us all. And we are all saved, largely in spite of ourselves, by grace and mercy—no exceptions! That is the perfection of the divine victory.

So it's not about being correct: it's about being connected. When you are connected to the whole chain, held in the nest of being, you can easily live out of a worldview of infinite and divine abundance rather than a "not enough love to go around" model that only creates fearful, fighting, and stingy people, pushing themselves to the front of the line because they are afraid there is not enough of God to fill and free everything.


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World Day to Combat Desertification

2019 marks the 25th anniversary of the UN Convention to Combat Desertification (UNCCD), so this year's campaign will run under the slogan '25 YEARS – Let's grow

the future together'.

Desertification is a type of land degradation in which a relatively dry land region becomes increasingly arid, typically losing its bodies of water as well as vegetation and wildlife. It is caused by a variety of factors, such as climate change, urbanization, over-drafting of groundwater, deforestation, natural disasters and tillage practices in agriculture that place soils more vulnerable to wind. Desertification is a significant global ecological and environmental problem and across the world it affects livelihood and health of millions of people who depend on the benefits of ecosystems that drylands provides.



The World Day to Combat Desertification is a unique occasion to remind everybody that desertification can be effectively tackled, that solutions are possible, and that key tools to this aim lay in strengthened community participation and co-operation at all levels.

Lord God, we pray that your holy and life-giving Spirit may so move in the hearts of men and women and among those who govern the nations that the barriers of fear, suspicion and hatred which separate us may crumble, and the body of humankind may be healed of its divisions and be united in addressing the serious problems of resource depletion, overpopulation and climate change all of which problems lead to the desertification of our land and ultimately food insecurity. 

World Giraffe Day

One of the world's most iconic animals, the giraffe, has slipped silently onto the

Endangered Species List.

Whilst giraffes are commonly seen in game reserves, in the media and in zoos, people - including conservationists - are unaware that these majestic animals are undergoing a silent extinction. Years of habitat destruction and poaching have reduced giraffe numbers by 40 percent, prompting the IUCN to move them from "least concern" to the "vulnerable" category for the first time.

With a this decline in the last three decades alone, the world's tallest animal is under severe pressure in some of its core ranges across East, Central and West

Africa. Poaching of elephants and rhinoceros and the illegal trade in pangolins has overshadowed the problems with giraffes in the last decade.

Pray for all those concerned with this majestic animal's safety.

Pope Francis - Laudato Si

"52. The foreign debt of poor countries has become a way of controlling them, yet this is not the case where ecological debt is concerned. In different ways, developing countries, where the most important reserves of the biosphere are found, continue to fuel the development of richer countries at the cost of their own present and future. The land of the southern poor is rich and mostly unpolluted, yet access to ownership of goods and resources for meeting vital needs is inhibited by a system of commercial relations and ownership which is structurally perverse. The developed countries ought to help pay this debt by significantly limiting their consumption of non-renewable energy and by assisting poorer countries to support policies and programmes of sustainable development. The poorest areas and countries are less capable of adopting new models for reducing environmental impact because they lack the wherewithal to develop the necessary processes and to cover their costs. We must continue to be aware that, regarding climate change, there are differentiated responsibilities. As the United States bishops have said, greater attention must be given to "the needs of the poor, the weak and the vulnerable, in a debate often dominated by more powerful interests". [31] We need to strengthen the conviction that we are one single human family. There are no frontiers or barriers, political or social, behind which we can hide, still less is there room for the globalization of indifference."



Particular threats outlined by the IPPR report include:

- Biodiversity loss: since 1970: the world has lost 60% of its vertebrate animal species.
- Biochemical flows: phosphorus and nitrogen from farms is entering our waters as run-off, creating dead zones which have too little oxygen to support life.
- Land use: 75% of the world's land suffers from soil erosion and other degradation, leading to a drop in crop yields.
- Ocean acidification: CO₂ absorption is increasing acidity at an accelerating rate, damaging marine life.
- Pollution: we face multiple threats from industrial and transport emissions, dust from farming and pesticides, radioactive materials, plastics and other pollutants

However, the ozone layer gives us a rare example of the world mustering the political will to reverse damage to a natural system by agreeing to ban CFC chemicals that were wearing a hole in the protective ozone layer.

Pray that the World's Leaders will have the political will to consider the environment in all their deliberations.
