Mother God

Why does it matter whether our image of God is masculine or feminine or even a non-binary gender? One reason is that it makes it easier for us to recognize the divine in us, whatever our gender. When we overemphasize masculine traits of the divine, many women, transgender, and intersex persons feel less-than, that their voices and bodies don't matter as much as men's, that God's image is not in them.



Marcus Borg points out many other good reasons to identify and honor the female (as well as non-gendered) images of God throughout the Bible:

- Male images for God are often associated with power, authority, and judgment. When used exclusively, they most often create an image of a punitive God. God must be appeased or else.
- Male images for God most often go with patriarchy—with male primacy and domination in society and the family.
- Male images of God most often go with domination over nature. Nature is often imaged as female ("mother earth") and domination over women extends to a rapacious use of nature.

Female images of God suggest something different. God is the one who gave birth to us and all that is. God wills our well-being, as a mother wills the well-being of the children of her womb. God is attached to us with a love that is tender and that will not let us go. And like a mother who sees the children of her womb threatened and oppressed, God can become fierce.

It is also important to realize that male and female metaphors for God are not intrinsically incompatible. God as "father" can be compassionate. This is the point of the parable of The Prodigal Son (Luke 15:11-32). So also in both Old and New Testaments, "the Lord" whom we are to love with all our heart, strength, and mind is also *compassionate*—a word whose semantic associations in Hebrew mean "womb-like."

Moreover, just as God as Lord is demanding, so is God as Wisdom/Sophia. Both images of God combine imperative and compassionate. It's not that one issues an imperative and the other one doesn't. The difference between "the strict parent" and "the nurturing parent" is *not* that the latter doesn't care about what happens. The nurturing parent—"Wisdom/Sophia"—teaches a way, indeed the way.

"The way"—the way of wisdom—is also what "the father" at his best teaches. The issue is not that mothers are better than fathers, but that a particular way of imaging "father" can produce a distorted form of Christianity—as if Christianity is about meeting the requirements of an authority figure who will punish us if we don't get it right.

Christianity is not about avoiding punishment or gaining reward. It is about loving God and loving what God loves. And what God loves is the whole of creation.

To love well, it seems to me (Richard), that one usually needs both feminine and masculine qualities.



World Lion Day

Mention the word "lion" and one immediately visualise a majestic lion with magnificent mane striding across the open plains, roaring loudly and stalking its hapless prey. A trip to Kruger Park hardly seems complete unless we have seen a lion!

Sadly, many people here and around the world are unaware that the global

wild lion population is in worrying decline. Over the last 20 years the lion population in Africa has been decimated, and forecasts for the future are not too bright. A couple of decades ago there were around 200,000 wild lions in Africa. Today, the latest surveys estimate that there are fewer than 25,000.



But for many Panthera Leo, the reality is more

devastating. It is estimated that more than two-thirds of South African lions are reared as captive animals, many for trophy hunting, a nefarious practice opposed around most of the world. While some lion cubs are bred ethically in legitimate conservation programmes, many others are severely mishandled. Many of these poor farmed lions are ultimately destined for paid hunting. On canned hunting farms, young lions are ripped from their mothers as cute young cubs, cooed over by paying public, and then mistreated and kept in tight enclosures until they are released into a larger compound, only to be cruelly gunned down or shot with an arrow while trapped in a baited cage. Their bones will make their way to the Far East where they will often be sold on the black market as tiger bones. Throughout their short lives they are often poorly fed and suffer high levels of stress – and they almost always end up pale and emaciated before meeting their unfortunate end.

This unethical and cruel treatment of these magnificent creatures as well as human encroachment, poaching, lion poisoning, illicit trade in lion bones and human/lion conflict have become a grave concern, prompting educational and awareness campaigns to save the king of the jungle.

What can you do to help the conservation of Africa's most famous animal?

- Do some research into canned lion hunting and become disgusted by this industry. Get motivated to do your bit.
- Resist the urge to pet those cute little cubs. No matter what you are told lions cannot be released back into the wild. South Africa does not have enough sanctuaries to take them. Very few lions have been rehabilitated and released back into the wild. Some lions have been rehabilitated (Elsa, the lioness of "Born Free" being the most famous), but it is a very costly and time consuming process.
- Raise awareness of the plight of these magnificent creatures and to urge people to help in whatever way they can.
- Pray for all involved in lion conservation and awareness.

Just think, Africa just wouldn't be the same without lions.

World Elephant Day

This day asks you to help conserve and protect elephants from the numerous threats face.

The elephant is loved, revered and respected by people and cultures around the

world, yet we balance on the brink of seeing the last of this magnificent creature. Elephants are the world's largest land animals and one of our most iconic species and are one of the few animals on earth that can recognize themselves in a mirror - which means that they have a sense of self, distinct from others! They are capable of complex thoughts and deep feelings, including love, anger and sadness.

Elephants are a keystone species, playing an important role in maintaining the biodiversity of the ecosystems in which they live. They flatten forests and dense grasslands, creating habitat for



smaller species. African elephants also dig water holes, which are used by other species. Elephants travel long distances in search for food, dispersing seeds contained in their waste along the way, helping to generate new green growth. In some areas, species of plants and trees rely entirely upon elephants for seed dispersal for their survival.

We admire elephants in part because they demonstrate what we consider the finest human traits: empathy, self-awareness, and social intelligence. But the way we treat them puts on display the very worst of human behaviour." Graydon Carter, Editor of Vanity Fair

"Elephants are simply one more natural resource that is being caught up in human greed on the one hand and human need on the other. We somehow need people to become reacquainted with nature or they can have no clue as to the interrelatedness of cause and effect." - Dr. Stephen Blake, Max Planck Institute for Ornithology

The goal of International Elephant Day is to create awareness of the urgent plight of elephants – both African and Asian, and to share knowledge and positive solutions for the better care and management of captive and wild elephants.

African elephants are listed as "Vulnerable" and Asian elephants as "Endangered"

on the IUCN Red List of threatened species. Could it be that these iconic gentle giants face extinction within twelve years?

The demand for ivory, which is highest in China, leads to the illegal poaching elephants. With the street value for ivory now exceeding that of gold, are elephants facing a poaching epidemic. Over 20,000 African elephants are poached every year.

Habitat loss due to deforestation, increases in mining, and agricultural activities has become increasingly problematic. Human-elephant conflict is a significant concern, as human populations increase and forest cover decreases, forcing elephants into close proximity with human settlements. Incidents include crop damage and economic losses, as well as both elephant and human casualties. The fragmentation of habitat also creates isolation - this makes breeding more difficult and allows poachers to find them more easily.



As icons of the continent elephants are tourism magnet

As icons of the continent elephants are tourism magnets, attracting funding that helps protect wilderness areas. They are also keystone species, playing an important role in maintaining the biodiversity of the ecosystems in which they live. Elephants are already feeling the impacts of global warming and climate change. Droughts lead to food shortages and reduced habitat. Droughts also disrupt the mating season, which leads to fewer offspring.

What can we do to help?

- Increase awareness of elephant's plight any way you can.
- Don't buy ivory and inform others why they shouldn't either.
- Support conservation efforts.
- Pray continuously for everyone involved in conserving these gentle giants!



World Mosquito Day

"Whilst World Mosquito Day is an opportunity to appreciate the fascinating

biology of these creatures, we can also reflect on the challenges that lie ahead in monitoring and controlling mosquitoes and the diseases they spread." - Dr Frances Hawkes, Research Fellow and Entomologist



Way back in 1897, Sir Ronald Ross

discovered the link between mosquitos and malaria transmission. World Mosquito Day is held to salute this ground-breaking work which paved the way for the many scientists following him to find ways to overcome this scourge. World Mosquito Day aims to raise awareness about the causes of malaria and how it can be prevented, as well as fundraising for research into the cure of malaria.

Mosquito-borne diseases have been recorded in human history for thousands of years as major causes of disability and death. The critical link of the malaria parasite to the *Anopheles* mosquito also showed that practical measures to prevent mosquito bites and control mosquito populations- - vector control - could be used to prevent malaria and other mosquito-borne diseases such as dengue, Zika, chikungunya and West Nile fever.

Rapid urbanisation, increases in international trade and travel, climate change and changing agricultural practices are all contributing to the increases in mosquito and other vector-borne diseases. History shows that vector control efforts need to be continuously supported by all countries to maintain expertise and capacity. This is essential to detect threats, prevent resurgence of deadly diseases and cope with new outbreaks of diseases.

Pray for:

- Continued breakthroughs in research involved with mosquito-borne diseases
- For the many people affected by and infected with these diseases
- For the necessary funding to be available for combating this problem

Daughters of Zelophehad

The five daughters of Zelophehad – Mahlah, Noah, Hoglah, Milcah and Tirzah – came to Moses with a concern over how the Promised Land was to be divided in relation to their family. Referenced in the Book of Numbers, these young women stood fearless and firm and as result reformed the culture of their day. Because they spoke up they



reversed precedent and claimed possession of their father's inheritance. The case of Zelophehad's daughters expanded the legal rights of women. Due to the ruling regarding the daughters of Zelophehad, women were included in the list of eligible heirs of property.

Numbers 27

27 The daughters of Zelophehad son of Hepher, the son of Gilead, the son of Makir, the son of Manasseh, belonged to the clans of Manasseh son of Joseph. The names of the daughters were Mahlah, Noah, Hoglah, Milkah and Tirzah. They came forward ² and stood before Moses, Eleazar the priest, the leaders and the whole assembly at the entrance to the tent of meeting and said, ³ "Our father died in the wilderness. He was not among Korah's followers, who banded together against the LORD, but he died for his own sin and left no sons. ⁴ Why should our father's name disappear from his clan because he had no son? Give us property among our father's relatives."

⁵ So Moses brought their case before the LORD, ⁶ and the LORD said to him, ⁷ "What Zelophehad's daughters are saying is right. You must certainly give them property as an inheritance among their father's relatives and give their father's inheritance to them.

⁸ "Say to the Israelites, 'If a man dies and leaves no son, give his inheritance to his daughter. ⁹ If he has no daughter, give his inheritance to his brothers. ¹⁰ If he has no brothers, give his inheritance to his father's brothers. ¹¹ If his father had no brothers, give his inheritance to the nearest relative in his clan, that he may possess it. This is to have the force of law for the Israelites, as the LORD commanded Moses




