

From Buddhism to Christianity to Hinduism to Islam, various faiths acknowledge the need for environmental stewardship and their holy texts urge adherents to be caretakers of the Earth and its biodiversity

Baha'i: "Nature is God's Will and is its expression in and through the contingent world." (Tablets of Bahá'u'lláh, p. 142)

Buddhism: "Our ancestors viewed the earth as rich and bountiful, which it is. Many people in the past also saw nature as inexhaustibly sustainable, which we now know is the case only if we care for it." (Dalai Lama, 1990a)

We thank you for being with us each day.


Encourage us, we pray, in our struggle,



World Oceans Day

The 2022 theme for the United Nations World Ocean Day is **Revitalization**: **Collective Action for the Ocean**.

Our ocean needs protection.

- Our ocean covers 70% of the planet and supports life as we know it
- Every second breath we take comes from the ocean
- Our ocean feeds billions of people
- Our ocean hosts 80% of the world's biodiversity.



We know the problems. We know the solutions – today is the day to take action and raise awareness – for yourself and everyone else..

We need to conserve our wonderful marine resources for future generations. Get involved - from raising awareness to taking action or simply enjoying sustainable seafood, there's plenty you can do to take part this World Oceans Day. Together, we're on a mission to end overfishing - a major global goal enshrined within the UN sustainable development goals.

Celebrate World Oceans Day – 10 Things You Can Do! Mind your carbon footprint and reduce energy consumption

Reduce the effects of climate change on the ocean by leaving the car at home when you can and being conscious of your energy use at home and work.

Make safe, sustainable seafood choices

Global fish populations are rapidly being depleted due to demand, loss of habitat, and unsustainable fishing practices. When shopping or dining out, help reduce the demand for overexploited species by choosing seafood that is both healthful and sustainable. Or just choose not to eat seafood.



Use fewer plastic products

Plastics that end up as ocean debris contribute to habitat destruction and entangle and kill tens of thousands of marine animals each year. To limit your impact, carry a reusable water bottle, store food in non-disposable containers, bring your own cloth tote or other reusable bag when shopping, and recycle whenever possible. Avoid single use plastic like straws, bags and bottled water.

Don't purchase items that exploit marine life

Certain products contribute to the harming of fragile coral reefs and marine populations. Avoid purchasing items such as coral jewelry, tortoiseshell hair accessories (made from hawksbill turtles), and shark products. Squalene found in cosmetics is derived from sharks.

Be an ocean-friendly pet owner

Read pet food labels and consider seafood sustainability when choosing a diet for your pet. Avoid stocking your aquarium with wild-caught saltwater fish, and never release any aquarium fish into the ocean or other bodies of water, a practice that can introduce non-native species harmful to the existing ecosystem.

Support organisations working to protect the ocean

Many institutes and organizations are fighting to protect ocean habitats and marine wildlife. Find a national organization and consider giving financial support or volunteering for hands-on work or advocacy. If you live near the coast, join up with a local branch or group and get involved in projects close to home. Sign petitions to help these organizations promote ocean-friendly legislation and sustainable ocean policy.

Influence community change through your choices.

Consider patronising restaurants and grocery stores that offer only sustainable seafood and speak up about your concerns if you spot a threatened species on the menu or at the seafood counter. Do an ocean presentation at your local school – kids love it! Do your homework and purchase products that reduce your impact on the planet – manufactured from sustainable sources. Buy local produce and organic when possible.

Whether you live by the ocean or not, all life on Earth is connected to the ocean and its inhabitants. The more you learn about the issues facing humanity's vital life support system, the more you'll want to help ensure its health—then share that knowledge to educate and inspire others to be the change we want to see in the sea.

Global Wind Day

Discover the power of wind energy

This annual worldwide event is a day for discovering wind energy, its power and the possibilities it holds to reshape our energy systems, decarbonise our economies and boost jobs and growth.



For thousands of years people have used windmills and the energy derived from wind to pump water and to grind corn. After a breakthrough by scientists, wind can now also be used to generate electricity. Wind energy, like solar energy, is a free renewable energy source and will never run out.

The amount of energy that can be extracted from the wind depends on its speed. The higher the wind speed, the more energy can be harnessed to generate electricity on a large scale. However, this requires large tracts of land to install enough wind turbines or generators, which are also noisy.

Wind as an energy source is only practical in areas that have strong and steady winds. South Africa has fair wind potential, especially along the coastal areas of Western and Eastern Cape.

This year National Youth Day and Youth Month will be celebrated under the theme: "Growing youth employment for an inclusive and transformed society."

UNICEF South Africa U-Report poll during November 2021 highlighted the specific impact of climate and environment related events on children and

young people but also hope for change through local youth initiatives, green economy jobs and climate action following COP 26. Some 80 per cent of young people say they have been directly affected by a climate or environment related event in South Africa, according to a UNICEF South Africa.



Of those impacted, 20 per cent said their home was damaged, 16 per cent stated that their education was disrupted and 14 per cent had limited access to safe water.

Children and young people are clearly already feeling the brunt of the climate crisis and environmental degradation – air pollution, drought, flooding, and water pollution the main reasons given for the impact.

There is optimism that the green economy could provide future employment - agriculture, tourism and renewable energy were the three areas identified by the youth as being of most interest to young people.

To strive towards a healthier environment and future for every child, UNICEF South Africa is calling for three actions:

- Include children and young people in all climate-related decisions, according to the 'SA Youth Climate Action Plan' developed by young people across the country, convened by the Youth Programmes at the South African Institute of International Affairs (Youth@SAIIA).
- Increase investment in climate adaptation and resilience in key services for children, including water, sanitation and hygiene systems, health and education.
- Reduce greenhouse gas emissions and create a just and equitable transition towards an environmentally sustainable and inclusive economy.

World Desertification Day



The theme of this international day acts as a reminder to each one of us that

2022 Theme - "Food. Feed. Fibre. - Healthy Land = Healthy People"

over-consumption can lead to desertification and encourages us to help protect the planet. It is only through cooperation and strong community efforts that this goal will be achieved.

Desertification is the process where what was once healthy land is now degraded. It can happen by drought,



deforestation or over-farming. Desertification is also happening due to climate change.

Desertification happens when nutrients in the soil become so few that the soil itself is no longer fertile, becoming arid. Natural deserts, contrarily, are born through organic processes which take a long time. It's good to know the difference.

Overconsumption is when the use of resources (in this case, the soil,) has outpaced the sustainable capacity of the ecosystem. Continued overconsumption leads to environmental degradation, and ultimately loss of resources **and** the capacity to produce enough food to feed a growing world population.

It all boils down to living sustainably! We need to continue to live in ways that doesn't harm the environment, or at the very least, cause the lowest possible impact on it. Living sustainably means that we do everything in our power to manage our needs in a way that will allow future generations to do the same.

Tuesday	21	Even though conservation efforts benefit some giraffe, others are in serious trouble
		"Whilst giraffe are commonly seen on safari, in the media, and in zoos, people – including conservationists – are unaware that these majestic animals are undergoing a silent extinction. While giraffe populations in southern Africa are doing just fine, the world's tallest animal is under severe pressure in some of its core ranges across East, Central and West Africa. It may come as a shock that three of the currently recognised nine subspecies are now considered 'Critically Endangered' or 'Endangered', but we have been sounding the alarm for a few years now." – says Dr Julian Fennessy, co-chair of the IUCN SSC GOSG, and Director of the Giraffe Conservation Foundation (GCF).
		Human population growth poses the largest threat to giraffe in Africa today. Habitat loss and changes through expanding agriculture and mining, illegal hunting, increasing human-wildlife conflict, and civil unrest are all factors that are pushing giraffe towards extinction.
		Give grateful thanks that the South African giraffe population is stable and pray that it remains so.
		Pray for the plight of giraffe in the rest of Africa, and for the scientists who are working so hard to protect them.

World Rainforest Day

Celebrating our rainforests on World Rainforest Day


World Rainforest Day is a collaborative effort to raise awareness and encourage action to protect the world's rainforests as well as an opportunity to celebrate this precious natural resource and take action to preserve it.

Rainforests are mainly located between the latitudes of 23.5°N (the Tropic of Cancer) and

23.5°S (the Tropic of Capricorn)—the tropics.

Rainforests are vital for the survival of life on Earth. Not only do they provide us with the freshwater we drink, but they absorb carbon dioxide, stabilize climate patterns, and provide a home to half the world's plant and animal





species. Over a quarter of the medicines we use today have their origins in the rainforests — and that's after only about 1% of rainforest plants have been examined for their medicinal properties!

And yet, over the last 40 years, deforestation has stripped an area equivalent to the size of Europe, or 1 billion hectares, from tropical rainforests.

Can we afford not to care?

Wednesday	29	Merton's Love of Nature Part of Thomas Merton's legacy, which I believe has been underappreciated, is his great love of nature. In the hills of Kentucky, he found his connection to God strengthened by every leaf, every tree, every sunrise. I felt it as well in my time at his hermitage. Theologian and GreenFaith fellow Sister Kathleen Deignan writes of Merton's relationship to the natural world, which inevitably led to his activism on the earth's behalf: Curiously, what remains hidden or obscure in [Merton's] very public discourse on matters of the sacred is the significance that the natural world played as the ecstatic ground of his own experience of God. But a close reading of his voluminous writings reveals his intimate rapport with and progressive espousal of creation as the body of divinity—at once veiling and unveiling the God he so longed to behold and be held by.

[Merton] chose to live alone in the forest as refuge for his own existential pain, but also to make reparation for the violation of earth and earth peoples. Here he became a poet, a protester, a prophet . . .

Deignan's selections from Merton's journals demonstrate how his love for nature (he even calls the forest his "bride") leads him to grieve and denounce nature's abuse:

I love the woods, particularly around the hermitage. Know every tree, every animal, every bird.

When I am most sickened by the things that are done by the country that surrounds this place I will take out the [Hebrew biblical] prophets and sing them in loud Latin across the hills and send their fiery words sailing south over the mountains to the place where they split atoms for the bombs in Tennessee.

There is also the non-ecology, the destructive unbalance of nature, poisoned and unsettled by bombs, by fallout, by exploitation: the land ruined, the waters contaminated, the soil charged with chemicals, ravaged with machinery, the houses of farmers falling apart because everybody goes to the city and stays there

It is necessary for me to live here alone without a woman, for the silence of the forest is my bride and the sweet dark warmth of the whole world is my love, and out of the heart of that dark warmth comes the secret that is heard only in silence, but it is the root of all the secrets that are whispered by all the lovers in their beds all over the world. I have an obligation to preserve the stillness, the silence, the poverty, the virginal point of pure nothingness which is at the center of all other loves. I cultivate this plant silently in the middle of the night and water it with psalms and prophecies in silence. It becomes the most beautiful of all the trees in the garden, at once the primordial paradise tree, the *axis mundi*, the cosmic axle, and the Cross.

Richard again: It is passages such as these which let you know why I, like so many tens of thousands, consider Merton a primary teacher of the spiritual life. In our time, maybe the primary teacher. He puts it all together (and with such good words, too).
