		National Marine Week
Monday	10	Who says you can't love the beach and live in Johannesburg? For those who are landlocked it can be challenging to support clean ocean initiatives when the only view you have of the surf is on holiday. Short of collecting beach rubbish while you're holidaying, there is not much that you can do or is there?
		The word "ocean" represents the entire marine environment, from the coast to far offshore, including and beyond our ocean borders or EEZ (Exclusive Economic Zone). It is a mysterious place, unexplored and full of wonder. There are many discoveries waiting to be made – benefits and influences, scientific discoveries and innovations. These mysteries need to be deciphered and uncovered, in order to show ordinary citizens how oceans play a role in their daily lives. The ocean produces more than half of the world's oxygen and absorbs 50 times more carbon dioxide than our atmosphere. Oceans regulate Climate and weather patterns.
		The oceans have the potential of being a major driver towards the betterment of South Africans. It is a vast natural resource and as a developing country we need to utilise these resources sustainably to ensure it builds a better South Africa. The use of the oceans for economic development needs to happen in a balanced and environmentally sustainable way
		Everyone has an obligation to do everything in their power to adopt a lifestyle that will protect the ocean such as avoiding ocean-harming products like cosmetics that contain shark squalene, jewelry made of coral or sea turtle shell, souvenir shells of conchs, nautiluses and other animals, and of course avoid single-use plastics like straws and water bottles that can end up in our oceans. Much of the waste that we produce eventually ends up in the oceans. Usage and wrong disposal of plastic is a major cause of marine pollution. Choose sustainable seafood that is healthy for you and the oceans from well- managed, wild fisheries.
		Destruction of the oceans and climate change go hand in hand, so reducing your carbon footprint mitigates both.

Tuesday	11	National <i>"Weedbuster Week"</i> aims to raise awareness about invasive alien plants (IAPs), their impact on South Africa's highly biodiverse ecosystems as well as the country's precious water resources.
		An invasive alien plant is a plant that is not indigenous to South Africa or the ecosystem in which it is found growing within the country. When an invasive alien plant species takes hold within the ecosystem and starts to spread, they can displace indigenous plant species through competition, as well as bringing about changes in ecosystem structure and function.

		Of particular concern at present is the Pompom weed which is rapidly
		becoming the most serious threat to the conservation of grasslands in South Africa. You can report sightings of these plants to the <i>Early</i> <i>Detection and Rapid Response team</i> (EDRR) (alienplants@sanbi.org.za) giving the exact locality (supply any landmarks or GPS information if possible).
		It is clear that this "all-out-war" needs to be fought on many fronts and one of those fronts is our back gardens, pavements and open areas in our communities and it is really up to us as individuals, to all get involved.

		63. Jesus tells the story of a man assaulted by thieves and lying injured on the wayside. Several persons passed him by, but failed to stop. These were people holding important social positions, yet lacking in real concern for the common good. They would not waste a couple of minutes caring for the injured man, or even in calling for help. Only one person stopped, approached the man and cared for him personally, even spending his own money to provide for his needs. He also gave him something that in our frenetic world we cling to tightly: he gave him his time. Certainly, he had his own plans for that day, his own needs, commitments and desires. Yet he was able to put all that aside when confronted with someone in need. Without even knowing the injured man, he saw him as deserving of his time and attention.
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		International Day for Natural Disaster Risk Reduction
Thursday	13	The International Day for Natural Disaster Risk Reduction was declared by United Nations General Assembly to promote a global culture of disaster risk reduction. It is an opportunity to acknowledge the progress being made toward preventing and reducing disaster risk and losses in lives, livelihoods, economies and basic infrastructure in line with the Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction 2015-2030, adopted in March 2015.
		There are two types of disaster: natural and man- made . Natural Disasters are caused by natural factors such as earthquake, flood, cyclone etc. Man-made disasters are caused by human activities such as conflict, fire accidents, industrial accidents etc.
		Disasters hit hardest at the local level with the potential to cause loss of life and great social and economic upheaval. Sudden onset disasters displace millions of people every year. Disasters, many of which are exacerbated by climate change, have a negative impact on investment in sustainable development and the desired outcomes.
		Sadly, South Africa is no stranger to disasters – both natural and human induced. The devastating Kwa-Zulu Natal floods earlier this year, wildfires in the Western Cape and continuing drought in many parts of the country bare testimony to this. South Africa does have a National Disaster Management Programme. However, how prepared are we in our own communities and in our Parishes to initiate immediate response to disasters in our neighbourhoods? Perhaps this should be part of our annual planning.
		Practical examples of disaster relief could be:
		 Response team on high alert Setting up temporary shelters that provide a safe place to sleep, food, and emotional support from trained personnel. Delivering meals and water. Distributing emergency supplies and necessities, such as toiletries for hygiene and tarps, shovels, trash bags for clean-up efforts. Consider your own and your community's preparedness for natural disasters.

Sunday	16	2022 Theme: "Leave NO ONE behind"
		 2022 finds us with an ongoing pandemic, conflict, a climate that won't stop warming, rising prices and international tensions. This is affecting global food security. We need to build a sustainable world where everyone, everywhere has regular access to enough nutritious food and no one should be left behind.
		Globally, progress has been made towards building a better world but too many people have been left behind. Millions of people around the world cannot afford a healthy diet, putting them at high risk of food insecurity and malnutrition. But ending hunger isn't only about supply. Enough food is produced today to feed everyone on the planet - the problem is access and availability of nutritious food, which is increasingly impeded by multiple challenges including the COVID-19 pandemic, conflict, climate change, inequality, rising prices and international tensions. People around the world are suffering the domino effects of challenges that know no borders.
		Whilst South Africa is food secure at national level, the country is still food insecure at household level as not all households have access to adequate food. Food inadequacy and hunger are still a challenge. Poverty-stricken households lack money to buy food and are unable to produce their own food. These households are constrained by the inability to secure employment or to generate income. Poor households are also typically characterised by few income-earners and many dependents, and are particularly vulnerable to economic shocks.
		Households with no children or fewer children were more likely to have adequate access to food than those with many children. According to a recent

		 report by Oxfam, child hunger was still a challenge in South Africa. More than half a million households with children aged five years or younger experienced hunger on a daily basis. More than half of households with young children that experienced hunger are in urban areas. A sustainable world is one where everyone counts - we must <i>ALL</i> be the change. As communities and individuals we need to decide how we respond to this crisis. <i>Prayerfully consider your response to this problem.</i>
		International Day for the Eradication of Poverty
Monday	17	2022 Theme: "Dignity for all in practice : the commitments we make together for social justice, peace and the planet"
		The International Day for the Eradication of Poverty presents an opportunity to acknowledge the effort and struggle of people living in poverty, a chance for them to make their concerns heard, and a moment to recognise that poor people are the first ones to fight against poverty. Participation of the poor themselves has been at the centre of the Day's celebration since its very beginning.
		Approximately 8% of the global population lives in extreme poverty, commonly defined as surviving on only \$1.90 (R28) day, or less. There's no "magic bullet" solution to poverty, but understanding its causes is a good first step.
		Inequality and Marginalisation - systemic barriers leaving groups of people without a voice or representation within their communities. Gender inequality, marginalisation based on race or tribal affiliations are all economic and social inequalities where people have little to no access to the resources needed to live a full, productive life. For a population to escape poverty, all groups must be involved in the decision-making process - especially when it comes to having a say in the things that determine their place in society.
		Conflict - Conflict is one of the most common forms of risk driving poverty. Violence has huge impacts on communities that are already struggling.
		Hunger, Malnutrition and Stunting - Poverty causes hunger but hunger also causes poverty. Lack of nutrition is known to be a cause of stunted growth in children – both in body and brain function. Research has shown that adults who were stunted as children earn, on average, 22% less than those who weren't stunted.
		Lack of education - Not every person without an education is living in extreme poverty, but most of the extremely poor don't have an education. There are many barriers to education including a lack of money for uniforms and books and a bias against girls' education. Poverty threatens education, but education can also help end poverty.
		Poor healthcare systems — especially for mothers and children - Extreme poverty and poor health often go hand in hand. Where health systems are

		weak, easily preventable and treatable illnesses like diarrhoea, and respiratory infections can be fatal - especially for young children.
		Little or no access to clean water, sanitation, and hygiene – Globally more than 2 billion people don't have access to clean water. In rural areas people (mainly women and girls) walk long distances daily to fetch water. Contaminated water can also lead to a host of waterborne diseases, ranging from the chronic to the life-threatening.
		Climate Change - Climate change creates hunger, whether through too little water (drought) or too much (flooding), and its effects contribute to the cycle of poverty in several other ways including disproportionately affecting women, creating refugees, and even influencing conflict.
		Lack of employment opportunities - Without a job or a livelihood, people will face poverty.

Saturday	22	UN Climate Change Conference (COP27) 06-18 November 2022 - Sharm El-Sheikh, Egypt The annual UN Climate Change Conference will be held in Egypt in November amidst unmet climate commitments, lingering disruptions due to COVID-19, finance uncertainties and energy and food challenges created by the war in Ukraine. The purpose of the Conference is to advance the global climate talks, mobilise action, and provide a significant opportunity to consider the impacts of climate change as well as global innovation and solutions.
		A real concern is that the Russia-Ukraine conflict is directly contributing to the exacerbation of the food price crisis, bringing to the fore the need for food supply chains resilience. The soaring food prices combined with the impacts of climate induced droughts will create an even grimmer outlook for food security in coming years. In addition to the food crisis, the scramble by many countries to find alternative sources to energy they used to get from Russia appears to be a setback for the climate agenda as new investments are being made in fossil fuels and new supply routes being created, making the current situation extremely difficult.
		The reality of climate change is evident, particularly for rural communities who depend on natural resources for their livelihoods. Urban centres see very little direct consequence on their daily lives other than the rising food costs and the inevitable loadshedding. Water comes from a tap but for rural communities

		Patron Saint of Ecology
Wednesday	26	One of the things Francis of Assisi is best known for is his love of nature. Pope John Paul II named him the Patron Saint of Ecology in 1979. Pope Francis entitled his encyclical about caring for our common home <i>Laudato Si</i> meaning "praise be to you," a phrase which Francis used repeatedly in his Canticle of the Creatures.
		St. Bonaventure (1221–1274), an early Franciscan mystic, taught that, "As a human being, Christ has something in common with all creatures. With the stone he shares existence; with plants he shares life; with animals he shares sensation; and with the angels he shares intelligence." In saying this, Bonaventure was trying to give theological weight to the deep experience Francis, who, as far as we know, was the first recorded Christian to call animals and elements and even the forces of nature by familial names, much as indigenous people have done for centuries: "Sister, Mother Earth," "Brother Wind," "Sister Water," and "Brother Fire."
		Francis was fully at home in this created world. He saw all things in the visible world as endless dynamic and operative symbols of the Real, a theater and training ground for a heaven that is already available to us in small doses in this life. <i>What you choose now, you shall have later</i> seems to be the realization of the saints. Not an idyllic hope for a later heaven but a living experience right now.
		We cannot jump over this world, or its woundedness, and still try to love God. We must love God <i>through, in, with,</i> and even <i>because of</i> this world. This is the message Christianity was supposed to initiate, proclaim, and encourage, and what Jesus modelled. We were made to love and trust this world, "to cultivate it and take care of it" (Genesis 2:15), but for some sad reason we preferred to emphasize the statement that comes in the previous chapter, which seems to say that we should "dominate" the earth (Genesis 1:28). I wonder if this is not another shape of our original sin. God "empties" Godself into creation, and then we humans spend most of history creating systems to control and subdue that creation for our own purposes and profit, reversing the divine pattern.
		In the spirit of St. Francis, read aloud this prayer of repentance, intention, and longing by one of his contemporary followers, Mirabai Starr:
		 Dear God, You created the world to serve our needs and to lead us to you. Through our own unconsciousness we have lost the beautiful relationship we once had with the rest of creation. 		Community garden

		Green your building
		The concrete structures often look unattractive to the eyes and do nothing for the environment as well. Adding in green will attract wildlife and help the environment by emitting oxygen back in the air. Adding vegetation on rooftops and balconies will help in greening the city. adding in the plant even provides psychological benefits to the people
		Reduce, reuse and recycle
		Recycling waste products and using them helps keep the city green and the environment eco-friendly by reusing the old products again in a creative way. Reducing the use of energy sources that releases harmful gases and pollutes the environment
