Monday	2	What a joyful and renewing experience it is to pray a Psalm in its nature setting!
		Nature and the Psalms
		The beauty of God's creation draws us to delight in God's goodness and his loving presence in the moment. And the prayer of the Psalmist gives voice and shape to our struggles and longings and connects us with God's loving heart.
		Psalm 1 and a Tree
		Sit near a tree as you meditate on Psalm 1. Reflect on what you fill your mind with as you go about your daily life. Perhaps there's some clutter in your head (e.g., worries, gossip, wishing things were different in your life, self-criticisms, angry conversations, lustful thoughts, lists of things you need to do, diversions).
		Pray that you'd be like the Psalm 1 Man who delights continually in God's law and his Word and so he easily and naturally bears much fruit. "He is like a tree planted by the streams of water" and "his delight is in the law of the Lord and on his law he meditates day and night" (verses 2-3).
		What is the Lord saying to you through the tree? How is your fruit bearing going?

Thursday	5	Encyclical Letter <i>Fratelli Tutti o</i> f Pope Francis on the Fraternity and Social Friendship
		Chapter Two Abandoned on the wayside
		65. The parable eloquently presents the basic decision we need to make in order to rebuild our wounded world. In the face of so much pain and suffering, our only course is to imitate the Good Samaritan. Any other decision would make us either one of the robbers or one of those who walked by without showing compassion for the sufferings of the man on the roadside. The parable shows us how a community can be rebuilt by men and women who identify with the vulnerability of others, who reject the creation of a society of exclusion, and act instead as neighbours, lifting up and rehabilitating the fallen for the sake of the common good. At the same time, it warns us about the attitude of those who think only of themselves and fail to shoulder the inevitable responsibilities of life as it is.
		66. The parable clearly does not indulge in abstract moralizing, nor is its message merely social and ethical. It speaks to us of an essential and often forgotten aspect of our common humanity: we were created for a fulfilment that can only be found in love. We cannot be indifferent to suffering; we cannot allow anyone to go through life as an outcast. Instead, we should feel indignant, challenged to emerge from our comfortable isolation and to be changed by our contact with human suffering. That is the meaning of dignity.

Creation Meditation

Lectio Divina (divine reading) is a way of drawing near to God through prayerful encounter with his word. This is a suggestion that through what I am choosing to call "creation meditation" we can also draw near to God through prayerful encounter with his natural world. This is probably best done on your own, and when you have a little time to give to it. It can be done outside on a walk, working or sitting in your garden, inside with something from the natural world, or simply through looking at a picture.

Reading - when you read words in Lectio Divina, you give the words your full and deep attention. In creation meditation, you give the natural world wherever you have chosen to be, your full and deep attention. Look closely and

carefully; touch if you can; listen; use all of your senses to become aware of what is around you. **Meditation** - what do you particularly notice today? Be still and see which part of the creation that surrounds you is drawing your attention. Reflect on what you are experiencing, acknowledging the feelings and the questions that go with that reflection. What might God be saying to you through your attentiveness today? Prayer - talk to God about what is bubbling up inside you. Be honest, he knows anyway. This is a conversation with a friend who loves you more than you can imagine and wants to bring light into your life. Contemplation - be still and let your God love you. Words are no longer necessary; simply enjoy time in the presence of God and let him give you what he knows you need. Light and Darkness, night and day. We marvel at the mystery of the stars. 20 **Friday** Moon and sky, sand and sea. We marvel at the mystery of the sun. Twilight, high noon, dusk and dawn. Though we are mortal, we are Creation's crown. Flesh and bone, steel and stone. We dwell in fragile, temporary shelters. Grant steadfast love, compassion, grace. Sustain us, Lord; our origin is duest. Splendour, mercy, majesty, love endure. We are but little lower than the angels. Resplendent skies, sunset, sunrise. The grandeur of Creation lifts our lives. Excerpt from Address by Archbishop Rowan Williams

"Jesus Christ: the Unanswered Questions" (44:20-49:35)

St Paul's Cathedral, 27 March, 2019

".... God has made us to be human. God has given us a unique particular role within creation, within creation – not at a distance from creation, not floating six feet above creation, but within creation. The physical world we are part of is a world we depend on. That's part of being human




– and the well-being of that physical world depends in some measure, on us. There is in God's creation a to-ing and fro-ing of gift. We as huma beings have something to give to the well-being of the created order around us. It is what gives us life. You might say that we are reminded of this that our creation is a neighbourhood. We live in a neighbourhood. We live in a dwelling place which is what the word "ecology" refers us to. The balance, the interaction, the giving and receiving in creation – that is part of being human. And so, if God is calling us to be fully human, if our full humanise is not something that prejudices or diminishes God, equally our full humanise doesn't deplete or demean the created order. And at a time of unprecedented crisis in the human relation with the material world, it does rather help to know this - we belong in a neighbourhood whose shared good is significant for each and every one of us, and each and every aspect or part of the created world.

..... what I wanted to do this evening is not so much to give a precis of my book Christ: Heart of Creation) but to suggest some of the ways in which looking afresh at a doctrine of Christ in the context of the doctrine of creation. Seeing how our doctrine of Christ fills out and enriches our doctrine of creation – how all of that can help us grow towards an new way of being before God in the world. Call it, if you like, a new spirituality. But certainly, a - new way of being human and understanding our humanity. A way of being human which, by acknowledging our dependence on the Creator and our interdependence on the creation, warns us against isolating our good, our projects, our purposes over and against the rest of creation, or the rest of humanity. It tells us that discovering that we move further towards the freedom that God wants us to exercise, to exercise with the grain of the whole of what God has made – human and non-human – all focusing on this notion at the heart of everything – God and the world do not

compete. God's own active being, what makes God to be God, and what particularly makes God to be God of the Word, the Word that makes all things come into being. Ad that is fully and unequivocally in the living and dying and rising of a human being – a part of the created order, in whom we see what each and every one of us, as creatures, may gradually grow towards.

Nature Is Ensouled

"By the word of the Lord the heavens were made" (Psalm 33:6). This tells us that the world came about as the result of a decision, not from chaos or chance, and this exalts it all the more. The creating word expresses a free choice. The universe did not emerge as the result of arbitrary omnipotence, a show of force or a desire for self-assertion. Creation is of the order



of love. God's love is the fundamental moving force in all created things: "For you love all things that exist, and detest none of the things that you have made; for you would not have made anything if you had hated it" (Wisdom 11:24). —**Pope Francis**

Acknowledging the intrinsic value and beauty of creation, elements, plants, and animals is a major paradigm shift for most Western Christians. In fact, many in the past often dismissed such thinking as animism or paganism. We limited God's love and salvation to our own human species and, then, in this theology of scarcity, we did not have enough love left to cover all of humanity! To be honest, God ended up looking quite stingy and inept. Hardly "victorious," as our Easter hymns claim.

The word *profane* comes from the Latin words *pro*, meaning "in front of," and *fanum*, meaning "temple." We thought we lived "outside the temple." Without a nature-based spirituality, it was a profane universe, bereft of Spirit, so we had to keep building shrines and churches to capture and hold our now domesticated and tamed God. Soon we did not know where to look for the

divine, as we made God's presence so limited. We became like fish looking for water, and often arguing about who owned the water! Note that I'm not saying God is all things (pantheism), but that each living thing reveals some aspect of God. God is both greater than the whole of our universe, and as Creator inter-penetrates all created things (panentheism). No exceptions. When you can enjoy this, "the world becomes a communion of subjects more than a collection of objects" as the "geologian" Fr. Thomas Berry (1914-2009) said so wisely. When you love something, you grant it soul, you see its soul, and you let its soul touch yours. You must love something deeply to know its soul. Before the resonance of love, you are largely blind to the meaning, value, and power of ordinary things to "save" you—to help you live in union with the source of all being. In fact, until you can appreciate and even delight in the soul of other things, even trees and animals, I doubt if you have discovered your own soul either. Soul knows soul. International Zebra Day

Zebras are iconic animals that cannot be mis-identified! Here in South Africa we are extremely fortunate to have a good stable population of our beloved Plains (previously Burchell's) Zebra – although our history with zebras is not great!



The quagga (Equus quagga quagga) is a subspecies of

the plains zebra that was endemic to South Africa until it was hunted to extinction in the late 19th century. It was long thought to be a distinct species,



but early genetic studies have supported it being a subspecies of plains zebra. Our history with the Mountain Zebra very nearly ended the same way, had it not been for a few forward-thinking conservationists. Early in the 20th century, there were less than 60 individuals and were facing almost certain extinction. In 1937, 1712 hectares of land was proclaimed as the Mountain Zebra National Park. Thanks to the conservation

efforts of farmers in the area, a small herd of the endangered Cape mountain zebra still survived in the area and these provided a founder population for the Park. Paul Michau donated 6 zebra and later Mr H L Lombard donated 11 zebra to the Park. An estimated 8170 zebras in over 76 sub-populations throughout South Africa, this is indeed good news!

However, elsewhere in Africa, zebra – especially the Grevy's zebra – (Kenya to Ethiopia) is in urgent need of conservation efforts as it is teetering on the edge of becoming endangered because of habitat loss and human interference.

Pray:

- Give thanks for the foresight of those early conservationists that we now have a thriving population of the handsome Mountain Zebra.
- Give thanks for the beauty of these magnificent animals

Pray for the conservation efforts of those involved in saving the Grevy's zebra that they would be similarly blessed.
